The Bible includes many stories of journeys. Abraham, the Israelite Nation, Jonah, the disciples, the two disciples on the way to Emmaus just to mention a few. Each of the journeys involved challenge, change and growth. Some of them knew where they were going, others did not. One thing that is clear in all of this is that somehow, God was involved.

Linda and I have journeyed alongside you for the past four years and in a short while our paths will separate. During the time we have been together sharing the journey with you we have been challenged, changed, grown, loved and cared for through the numerous things that we

Since March 2020, Calderdale Circuit, along with the rest of the country, suddenly hit the brakes and the journey took a new route. When we could no longer worship together in our churches, new ways of connecting to each other and caring for each other began to be set up. Even now, 18 months later, we are still learning how to do these things effectively.



The Pastoral Care system so precious to Methodist Churches, has been the central pillar of keeping us aware of each other's needs and communicating what is happening. It has been vital to those who are not technically minded and only know the term 'zoom' when referring to a camera or binoculars!

A letter from Paula Prosser

Dear Friends,

in one sense I cannot believe that I am writing this final letter as I didn't expect to be leaving so soon. When I became the Pastor at Boothtown and Southowram I thought that I would be there until I reach retirement age.

At the end of October one of my sisters was found dead, this was a complete and utter shock. My life changed that day, I realised that life was precious and fragile more than I had ever thought before. I began to reflect about my life, could I carry on giving as much as I had been doing, when it was me who was needing support and comfort at this time.



In January Steve took early retirement and it made me think about it even more especially as he's not well. It hasn't been an easy decision to make, as I love the work I do, but after a lot of prayer and support from family and friends I made the decision to take early retirement.

I have worked in the Calderdale (previous Halifax) Circuit for 16 years and I have loved my work. I believe it has been the fulfilment of my calling even more so when I became the Lay Pastor at Boothtown and Southowram. In 1994 I went to Cliff College for a year, to see where that would lead me as I felt God calling me to ministry of some kind. It was while at Cliff I met Steve (it was dislike at first sight for both of us) love blossomed in the last few months of been there and we got engaged on the last day of term. Next month we will celebrate our Silver Wedding.

When I first started working in the Circuit our daughter Sarah was nearly 6, she is now married with 2 children of her own. I remember when I first started work, she would often say 'are you eating or drinking today?' Friday's it was lunches at Illingworth Moor and Coffee Morning at Boothtown on a Thursday.

My roles within the Circuit have changed over the years, but up until Covid Friday was still an eating day and Thursday was a drinking day.

Over the years I have worked in Northowram, Boothtown, Illingworth, Southowram, Illingworth, and Mount Zion. I have met, listened, and spoken to many people and walked alongside many in the community who don't come to Church but have needed help and support, showing God's love in Continued on next page . . .

action. Sitting on a seat outside a supermarket listening to people and them thanking me for listening to them. Going out into the community with Busoasis and sharing together and getting to know people, this led to the first service on Busoasis.

Going into the sheltered housing complex and listening to them say we used to have a service but some weeks there were only three of us, so they decided not to come again, I said I would do a service for them and so Sharon and I started doing services for them along with lots of other things with them.

I have enjoyed working with children over the years, in Toddler Groups, Craft Club, Messy Church going into BB and GB, the Victorian Days at Mt Zion, working in schools as part of the team delivering 'Open the Book' and Sharon and I have done Prayer Spaces with Years 1-6 and the 'Unique Course' with groups of Year 5 & 6 girls.

None of us know when we talk and listen to people what effect that we have on them, we may never hear how our words and actions have helped people, the main thing is that we have been there for them.

I have made many friends over the 16 years, I have worked within different Staff Teams and Leadership Teams, there is one person who has been with me from the start, Stella Christie. I remember going on our

induction course together, and over the years to the Connecting Disciples conferences, Stella was always the driver and knew all the best places to stop for Coffee and cake on the way down.

Those who know me well know that I am hopeless at reading maps and even listening to the Sat Nav, so have got the driver lost on more than one occasion but we have always reached our destination.



As I reflect on the last 16 years, I give thanks for the friendships I have made, for the new things that I have learnt over the years. There have been frustrations but that is normal in any job.

I am looking forward to my retirement and spending more time with Steve, Sarah, and her family. Steve has ideas I will be helping him more at the allotment but I'm not sure about that!! I hope to spend more time doing the hobbies I enjoy and maybe find a new one. Hopefully going on plenty of holidays and visiting more place around the UK some of them may be on the back of Steve's motorbike.

This year we are helping the people of Butagaya in Uganda, with the Change Begins with a Bicycle campaign. A local partner provides bikes to members of this rural community, enabling them to access places such as schools, health facilities and markets. During Uganda's initial lockdown public transport was banned – including 'boda boda' motorbikes, which many of the community rely on to travel. FABIO, All We Can's local partner, provided regularly sanitised bicycles to more than 1,200 households as part of their emergency response.


